## **Tea Utensils for Tea Diary Entry Assignment**



Tea caddy, named Ueda Bunrin, with silk storage bag and lacquer tray Southern Song dynasty, 13th century

Stoneware with iron glaze, ivory lid, silk storage bag H x Diam (tea caddy):  $5.8 \times 5.9$  cm ( $2.5/16 \times 2.5/16$  in)

H x Diam (lacquer tray):  $3 \times 17.2$  cm (1 3/16 × 6 3/4 in)

Diam (tea caddy foot): 1.7 cm (11/16 in) Diam (tea caddy mouth): 2.5 cm (1 in) Origin: Fujian province, China
